DON'T BE BUGGED

Summer is just around the corner, which means it's time for backyard fun and frolic. We all look forward to this time of the year, but so do all the tiny flying nuisance which normally send us running indoors for stinky sprays, or just some relief from the swarms. NEWS ON MR. MENCKEN'S HOUSE

By his own estimation, H.L. Mencken penned ten million words in a nearly fifty year career as a journalist, literary critic and cultural gadfly. From his home at 1524 Hollins Street (it held six-thousand books!) on Union Square, Mencken took aim at American life and letters in a fashion never before seen, and unlikely to ever be seen again. A true American original, he reportedly said of Sinclair Lewis' *Main Street*, "That idiot has written a masterpiece." Mencken is also famous for having coined the term "Bible Belt." Doesn't that sound just like one of your neighbors?

Although his legacy lives on (see *The Skeptic* by Terry Teachout), his house has found the going a bit rough. In the years since the demise of the City Life Museums, the property has fallen between the cracks as it were and many have wondered what would become of it. Wonder no more.

Roughly a year ago, the *Baltimore Sun*, at the behest of then publisher Michael Waller, began to investigate the possibility of acquiring the house and developing plans for its return to public life. This decision was in part motivated by Mr. Waller's concern that as a new, highly touted biography (*The Skeptic*) hit the bookstores, the house was about ready to slide into the street. No one, least of all the publisher of the *Sun*, felt that this would reflect well on the city or on Mencken's longtime employer. The *Sun* began to introduce this idea to interested parties citywide. Those parties – Enoch Pratt Library, Goucher College (Mencken's wife, Sarah, taught there) Maryland Historical Society, The Friends of the Mencken House, The Mencken Society and Union Square Association — met with the *Sun* and began a discussion centered on the notion of The *Sun* acquiring the house. While not everyone involved was exactly wild about the idea, many were, and it was generally agreed that the *Sun*'s acquisition of the house was the best scenario available and given the city's strong support of this idea, it was decided by all to move forward.

Fast forward to the present. Currently an advisory board made up of one person from each of the above-named entities plus two individuals from The *Sun* are meeting monthly to address the many issues that arise from such an undertaking. The immediate concern, (a stipulation by the City) is the creation of a new non-profit, to which the house would be sold.

Discussions are well underway as to public use. Initially, it is thought the house will be developed as a writer's center, not a museum. Once the first phase of rehabilitation is completed, (no date on that yet, as transfer of ownership is still underway) plans are to begin holding small public readings by noted authors as a way of reintroducing the house to the public.
